

Commercial Influences on Health -

- the practices and policies of corporations, trade associations and other business groups that shape patterns of health and disease; constitutes a key modifiable social determinant of health



	Tobacco/Nicotine	Pharmaceutical Pharma			
Lobbying	Oppose taxes, smoking bans or regulation of marketing	Lobby regional and national governments to defeat regulation that reduces profits, even when it benefits population health			
Campaign contributions	Contribute to campaigns of politicians who oppose regulation of tobacco or nicotine	Contribute to campaigns of politicians who oppose regulation of pharmaceutical industry			
Public relations	Advocate individual choice and responsibility, free trade self-regulation and public-private partnerships	Fund grassroots groups or scientists to promote industry messages, resist regulation			
Philanthropy	Contribute to popular causes to enhance credibility and enlist grantees in supporting (or not opposing) industry in public debates	Fund patients' rights groups that advance drug industry policies			
Sponsored scientific research	Sponsor research that obfuscates harms, fund researchers to produce negative findings, mask industry sponsorship of scientific research	Fund researchers who cast their products in favorable light, discredit critics, obfuscate harms



Reduce and control conflicts of interest

 Regulation requires both scientific evidence and public support.




